Do I need to have experience?

We provide you with training, so you don't need specific experience to be a Peer Researcher. We are looking for people who care about increasing the diversity and inclusivity of CLTs.

You will need to be eager to learn, curious, reliable and open minded to become a good Peer Researcher.

How does this work during Covid-19?

Our training is designed to be online and you can conduct your research using a smartphone app.

You can choose to interview people in person or remotely if you prefer.

Is the training paid & when is it?

Yes, the training and any work you do is paid <u>Real Living Wage</u>. You will work up to 40 hours in total between January & March 2022.

The main training will take place over 2 days during the 2nd week of January 2022.

Who do you mean by minority & marginalised groups?

We know that some groups are underrepresented in CLTs. We are interested in hearing from people:

- from minority ethnic backgrounds
- who are younger (working age)
- who identify as coming from a lower income background
